GOING TO A PARTY OFF-CAMPUS?

Then agree with us:

HOSTING A PARTY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD?

Then know the consequences when the party gets disruptive:

The **DISTURBING THE PEACE ORDINANCE** prohibits anyone who shall disturb the public peace and quiet. You can be fined up to \$500 upon conviction.

It is illegal to have an **OPEN CONTAINER OF ALCOHOL** in a motor vehicle. People carrying alcohol out of a party can be arrested if they get into their cars with an open container.

DRINKING ON PUBLIC PROPERTY ORDINANCE: It is illegal to consume alcohol on any public property; this includes streets, right-of-way and sidewalks. If your party spills outside you need to be aware of this ordinance.

The Nebraska Liquor Laws-Nebraska law prohibits persons under 21 years of age from possessing or consuming alcohol. If you attend a party, you and the resident/renter and owner of the house are responsible for underage drinking and can be charged with **PROCURING ALCOHOL FOR MINORS** or, if you charge admittance, **SALE OF ALCOHOL WITHOUT A LICENSE**. You could face fines of up to \$500 and up to 30 days in jail for Procuring Alcohol for Minors.
